



Voters' Attitudes on Public Safety Issues in Shelby County



Key Findings from a survey of 400 registered voters in Shelby County, TN. January 9-11, 2024



Methodology



Public Opinion Strategies presents the key findings from a survey of 400 registered voters in Shelby County, Tennessee.

The survey was conducted January 9-11, 2024 and has a margin of error of ±4.9%. Interviews were completed via landline and cell phones and mobile text-to-web.

Patrick Lanne was the primary researcher and pollster on the project. Chris Andrews was the project director and Ruby Miller provided analytical assistance.

Public Opinion Strategies completed two previous surveys for the Crime Commission: July 26-28, 2020 (N=450) and September 18-22, 2021 (N=425).


Crime has skyrocketed to the top of the issue agenda.

Over half (57%) of Shelby County voters name crime as their top priority for elected officials—more than doubling the number of voters who named crime (22%) as their top priority in 2021.

Crime ranks as the top priority for every major demographic and geographic subgroup in the poll.

When asked which specific crime and public safety issue was the most important to focus on, Shelby County voters named gun violence (38%) their top concern with juvenile crime (22%) a distant second. Gun violence ranked highest with all major subgroups.

A quarter of county voters report being a victim of violent crime.




First, have you ever been a victim of a violent crime?

Next, have you ever been a victim of a property crime such as burglary, vehicle theft or vehicle break in?










Crime dominates the Shelby County issue agenda.



First, which ONE of the following issues do you believe should be the top priority for government leaders? Is it....




Crime is the top issue with every subgroup.

Key Findings: Outlook on the **Criminal Justice** System

Since our 2021 poll, Shelby County voters express more concern about their personal safety and more negativity about the criminal justice system.

- First, just 58% of Shelby County voters say they feel safe in their neighborhood that's down from 77% in 2021. In addition, the share of voters who say they "always feels safe" declined 13-points since 2020. Finally, the number of voters who report feeling "unsafe" has nearly tripled (17% from 6%) since 2021.
- Next, Only 30% of voters believe crime victims receive "a lot" (4%) or "some"
 (30%) support and assistance from the criminal justice system. That represents
 a 10-point drop from our last poll.



- Additionally, perception of the criminal justice system being too lenient for both juvenile offenders (+29) and adult offenders (+16) soared. Importantly, every major subgroup believes both juvenile and adult offenders are treated too leniently with subtle differences by race and geography.
- Finally, in a near consensus, Shelby County voters endorse a proposal to require supervision for juvenile offenders past their 19th birthdays: 87% support 8% oppose. The overwhelming majority of every major subgroup supports the proposal. And, support for the measure is extremely deep (72% strongly support).

Fewer Shelby County voters say they feel safe in their neighborhood.





First, how effective do you think community involvement through neighborhood-based groups like Neighborhood Watch are in preventing crime?






Concern about leniency in the criminal justice system spiked.



Key Findings: Local Police Job Performance

The job rating for local police departments declined across the county since our 2020 poll. Today, a slim majority (51%) rate their local police performance positively – a drop of 20 points. In addition, the number of voters who give their police department an "excellent" rating is now tied with those who give the police a "poor" rating at 16%.

Overall, job ratings for the local police dropped with every subset of voters. There are significant differences by geography and race:

- In Memphis, just 41% of voters give the police an "excellent/good" rating. In the rest of the county, 69% of voters say the police are doing an "excellent/good" job.
- The "excellent/good" rating for local police is lower among African-American voters (42%) than white voters (65%).


More specifically, seven-in-ten voters give the police negative marks on "protecting people from violent crime" – continuing a downward trend from our last poll.

While overall ratings for the police dropped, Shelby County voters continue to overwhelmingly agree with the following statements:

- I respect my local law enforcement (93% agree)
- My friends and neighbors generally respect local law enforcement (87% agree)
- I would like an increased local law enforcement presence in my neighborhood (75% agree)

Voters are split on the job performance of local police.

How would you rate the job your local police are doing in your neighborhood?



In Memphis, local police receive a net negative rating. In the rest of the county, local police continue to receive positive marks, but the net rating declined at a similar rate as Memphis.

Local Police Performance by Geography








The police receive a net negative rating from African-American voters. White voters remain 2:1 positive overall but significantly less positive than 2020.


Local Police Performance by Race








There has been a dramatic drop in confidence among younger voters.

Local Police Performance by Victim of Crime








The rating for "protecting people from violent crime" plummeted.









"Protecting People From Violent Crime" by Age


Shelby County voters continue to strongly endorse hiring policy officers (84% total support). Indeed, support has hardened since our 2021 poll with 69% of voters strongly supporting hiring more police compared to 59% in 2021.

Every public safety proposal we tested enjoyed a near consensus level of support among Shelby County voters.

Each proposal scored above 77% total support. Five of the six proposals received 87% support or higher and three of the six items scored 95% support or higher.

The proposals were overwhelmingly endorsed by every major subgroup.

There remains overwhelming support for hiring more police officers, with an uptick in intensity this year.







Support for hiring more officers cuts across all subgroups.



Take Away Points



Takeaway Points



- ✓ With elevated concerns about personal safety and the county's level of crime, Shelby County voters express more negativity toward the criminal justice system and its institutions.
- ✓ While the job rating for local police decline, voters continue to express a high degree of respect for police officers. They would like a stronger police presence in their communities and overwhelmingly endorse hiring more police officers.
- ✓ The outlook on crime and the police vary by race and geography, but the trend lines are similar across the demographic and geographic subgroups.
- ✓ In this public safety environment, proposals calling for more public safety resources and greater accountability in the system enjoy broad support.
